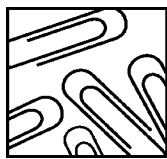
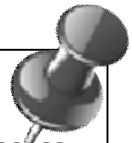

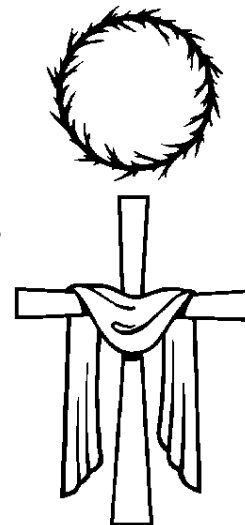
### STEWARDSHIP REQUIRES REFLECTION

## Holy Women, Holy Men



*This is one in a series of articles highlighting some of the newer commemorations in the Episcopal Church's Calendar of Saints.*

**William W. Mayo, Charles F. Menninger, and Their Sons**  
Pioneers in Medicine, 1911, 1953

William W. Mayo, with his two sons, William J. Mayo and Charles H. Mayo, built St. Mary's, the first general hospital in Minnesota. When a devastating tornado struck Rochester, Minnesota, in August 1883, the Mayos joined with the Sisters of St. Francis to respond to the disaster. This partnership between the Episcopalian Mayos and the Roman Catholic Sisters raised a few eyebrows, but became well known for a new type of patient care that emphasized the whole person, spiritually as well as physically.

Building on a vision of doctors working as a team with other medical professionals, not as solo diagnosticians, the Mayos aggressively opened their doors to other doctors and

medical researchers. St. Mary's Hospital and what would become The Mayo Clinic became a model for integrating person-centered medical care with the best in cutting edge scientific and medical research. The Mayo Clinics continue today as outstanding centers for patient care and medical research.

Charles F. Menninger, together with his sons, Karl and William, were pioneers in establishing a new kind of psychiatric treatment facility in Topeka, Kansas, founded in 1925. They played a major role in transforming the care of the mentally ill in ways that were not only more medically effective, but were also more humane. Among the notable accomplishments of the Menninger Clinic has been its advocacy for better treatment and a more informed public policy in support of the needs of the mentally ill.

The work of the Mayos and Menningers was transformative because of their commitment to treating the whole person—physically, emotionally, and spiritually.

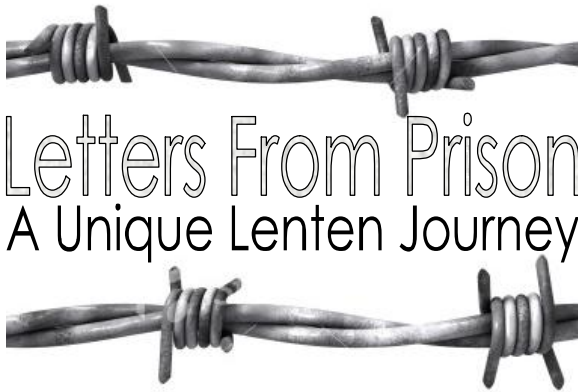

The season of preparation for Easter that is set aside for fasting, penitence, almsgiving, prayer and study. It is counted as 40 days (not including Sundays and Feast Days). It begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at the Great Vigil of Easter.

## A Unique Lenten Journey

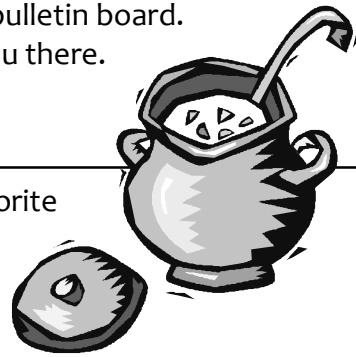
Join the rector for a brief excursion through the writings of Christians who were willing to go to jail rather than compromise their religious beliefs. **Saint Paul, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Dorothy Day and Martin Luther King, Jr.** represent a broad spectrum of experiences and causes from simple evangelism, anti-Nazi activi-

ties, and nuclear protests to the cause of civil rights.

While not a traditional topic for Lent, we may, nevertheless, find solidarity with our Savior - whose imprisonment forms the backdrop of Holy Week.

So, join us on Tuesday nights for a meal of soup and salad at 6 :30 pm, a presentation/discussion at 7:00 pm, followed by a brief meditative worship service. Tuesdays - March 15, 22, 29, and April 5.

### ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICE

Lent lasts for forty days, reflective of the forty days Satan tempted Jesus in the wilderness ([Matthew 4:1-11](#)). As Christians enter their own symbolic wilderness during Lent, they remember their own humanity, vulnerable to temptation, just like Jesus in the wilderness.



On March 9th, our faith community will come together to mark the beginning of Lent. We will do this in song & scripture, and by the imposition of ashes, which symbolize our mortality.

### LENTEN MATERIALS AVAILABLE IN THE NARTHEX

*Renewed For Life* is designed to help you receive more fully the blessings of Prayer, Silence, Solitude and the Presence of God in the world... The reflections are drawn from the popular work of Henri Nouwen and are appropriate for individuals and groups.

*Let God's People Go!* Through Moses, God saved the Israelites from slavery in Egypt and led them to freedom. This Lenten sticker journey helps children discover how the saving grace of Jesus leads us from slavery to sin and death into freedom and everlasting life. Includes daily prayers and readings for families.

### THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION

Guests of our worship services sometimes remark that they are particularly moved by the act and words of the General Confession of Sin. But many of them are surprised and/or shocked to learn that Episcopalians also have the option of individual confession. Invariably, the question is asked, "Isn't that just for [Roman] Catholics?" The short answer is, "no." There are, however, important differences. For example, all Roman Catholics are encouraged to regularly make their confession while the Episcopal Church follows the old rule, "None must, all may, some should." This makes clear the optional nature of the rite.

Our baptismal promises (pp 304-305, *Book of Common Prayer*) assume that we will sin, that we will know failure and disappointment, and that we will cause pain to ourselves and to others. In these

promises we express our willingness to acknowledge our faults, make amends, and to seek and receive God's forgiveness. Most of the time we fulfill these promises either alone or in the context of corporate worship. However, there are times when doubts or questions persist. At those times, there is the option of private and confidential confession in the presence of a priest found in the Prayer Book (p 447 & 449).

Lent is an especially good time to consider the benefits of this discipline.

LifeSongs is designed to become a win-win enterprise, providing performance venues for rising musicians. Gus also works three days each week fundraising for the Delaware Humanities Forum. And in his spare time (!?) he markets "ready to eat and easy to fix gourmet foods" through home parties for Tastefully Simple. (Hint: Ask Gus about "Nana's Apple Cake" or the "Bountiful Beer Bread".)

Gus grew up in Pike Creek and met Justin in Texas (where he grew up). Justin was teaching Spanish and Gus was working on his Master's Degree. When Gus received a Fulbright Grant to go to Germany for a year of singing and study,



they decided to go together. That's where they discovered the Convocation of Episcopal Churches in Europe was a place where a Catholic and a Baptist could enjoy worshipping together.

When they moved to Delaware, Justin began checking the web sites of local churches so they could begin church shopping. St. David's looked friendly, so it became their first – and last – stop. Gus had occasionally served as a guest singer at Trinity Church and remembered Father Brad. Both felt welcomed by St. David's community and decided the liturgy here just "feels right." They like Brad's style of preaching "with the people – not from a pulpit on high," and that he isn't afraid to incorporate "real issues" in his sermon. "Of course," Justin says, "It doesn't hurt that Brad's from the South."

St. David's is truly blessed with the joy, enthusiasm and talents of Gus and Justin!

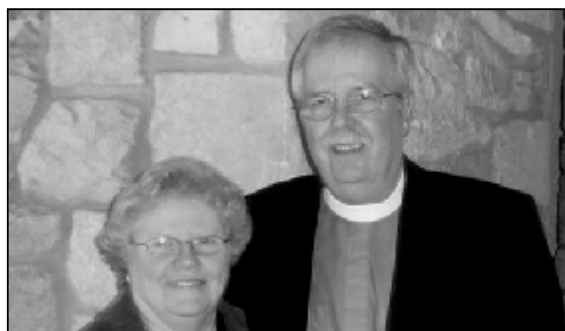
## WE WELCOME...

## SO...

### WHAT IS A SHROVE?

Shrove Tuesday gets its name from the ritual of shricing, when the faithful confessed their sins to the local priest and received forgiveness before the Lenten season began. As far back as 1000 AD, "to shrive" meant to hear confessions. (Trivia note: the term survives today in the expression "short shrift" or giving little attention to anyone's explanations or excuses).

Historically, Ash Wednesday marked the beginning of the 40-day Lenten fasting period when the faithful were forbidden by the church to consume meat, butter,

eggs or milk. However, if a family had a store of these foods they all would go bad by the time the fast ended on Easter Sunday. What to do?

Solution: use up the milk, butter and eggs no later than Shrove Tuesday. And so, with the addition of a little flour, the solution quickly presented itself in... pancakes. And lots of 'em! Why not fry up that sausage, as well!



## THE UNITED THANK OFFERING (UTO)

The United Thank Offering is a program of the Episcopal Church for the mission of the whole church.

The mission of the United Thank Offering is to invite people to offer daily prayers of thanksgiving to God and as an outward and visible signs of those prayers to place an offering in the blue box which will be used to benefit others.

God calls each of us to grow in awareness of God, our own relationship with God, and our relationship in community with all whom God has created. As habits of daily thankful prayer mature, our personal relationship with God grows. Daily prayers of thanksgiving strengthen our being and doing.



The blue box can be a reminder of our many blessings. Uniting our own gifts of thanks with those of others keeps us in thankful relationship with them and with all of creation. In sharing our thank offerings we deepen our sense of participation in the lives of others.

For the little ones in your home, you may want to incorporate the blue box into your family's daily dinner time prayer together. Each child can be given a quarter, or other coin, which is then deposited in the blue box while giving thanks for something in their lives. This is also a good time to discuss what Lent is all about.

What a perfect time to start this United Thank Offering than this Lenten season. Please pick up your box and envelope in the narthex. The 2011 UTO will start on Sunday, March 13 and will end on Sunday May 1.

## WALK TO EASTER IS COMING!

As many of you know, every year on Good Friday, St. David's offers its biggest "kid" event of the year – Walk to Easter. This event, which draws almost 100 children from St. David's school, church and surrounding community, helps children understand the mystery of Easter by 'walking them through' the story of Jesus from Palm Sunday to Easter.

### We need volunteers.

Because this is such a large event, we need many volunteers to help. The session, which runs from 9 am to noon, has seven different stations, through which small groups of children rotate. This year our stations will include: card making, pretzel baking, butterfly making, cookie decorating, Easter cross making, sheep making, singing and the actual "Walk" through the church hearing the Holy Week story. We need lots of help on that day to either work with the children directly or help out behind-the-scenes. There are also "pre-Walk to Easter"

If none of those options appeal to you, there are plenty more organizational activities that need to be done in preparation for the awesome event.

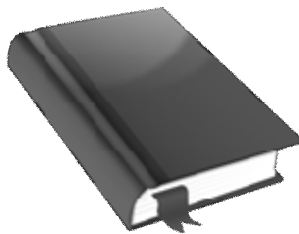


### REMEMBER...

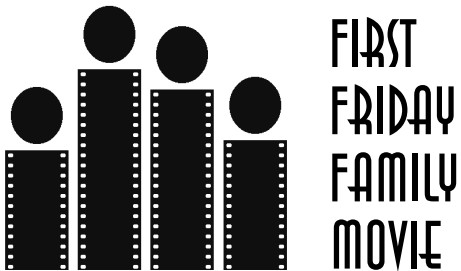
